Text A – THE ART DEALER

“It is a myth,” says Anna-Mei Chadwick, “that running an art gallery is all about opening shows and bottles of wine.” She regularly works ten hours a day, seven days a week. She regards herself first and foremost as a retailer.

“The retail trade is very tough — you need stamina and a lot of help. Dealing with the general public takes a certain strength. Anybody can walk through the door.”

Initially, she approached artists she knew and found others by going to shows and competitions. She concentrates on artists with promise who are not necessarily well-known.

“We don’t pay retainers and we don’t have exclusive contracts with our artists, so we rely on their loyalty to come back. We have a set commission for all our artists. They know we don’t juggle around with the prices on the wall. If you give discounts, people know that the pictures on the wall were overpriced in the first place.”

Each year the gallery runs seventeen shows. Although turnover has risen steadily since the gallery opened, it was two years before she took on a full-time assistant. She still needs to be in the gallery much of the time. Clients and artists expect to see her. “Running an art gallery is a very personal business — you have to be there rather than an assistant.”

Text B –THE FURNITURE MAKER

To describe Dennis Young as a carpenter is unfair. For Young is a woodworking virtuoso. This American artist fashions beautiful writing desks for Japanese rooms, accepts commissions to recreate Korean bureaus and sculpts from wood his own variation of the modern Windsor chair. At the same time, he voices great concern over the disappearance of traditional skills in Japan, including years of woodworking craftsmanship.

“My first experience of making furniture was in Japan. At that time in Japan it was not unusual to find hand-made merchandise. But traditional-style workshops have become very, very rare.”

After learning the basic skills in Japan, Young went to England and was apprenticed at a small workshop in order to master the skill of making Windsor chairs. He went back to the United States to open his own workshop, so and quickly established a reputation as one of the leading modern cabinetmakers. His bow-back chair, the fruit of years of effort to simplify the traditional Windsor chair to fit modern environments, has won many prizes. Some of his finest pieces have been displayed at London’s Victoria and Albert Museum.

Young has developed some unique working techniques: he uses American machines that are more than one hundred years old to do the basic job of shaping the wood and then he switches to English and Japanese tools for the details. Three years ago, Young returned to Japan, giving up a successful business in California because he found it difficult to balance commercial success with his commitment to the artistic aspects of woodworking.

Text C -THE AIR STEWARDESS

It was 3 am. Joanne ate her breakfast with her eyes closed. Her flight was due to leave at 6 am. She had to be at the airport for 4.30 am.

“I’ve got one hour to make myself ‘presentable’ for work. It’s a wonderful word, isn’t it? All things to all people — reassuring professional to the over-anxious first-time flyers, challenge and disciplinarian to the lager louts, bubbling bimbo to the old hands of the flight crew.”

She opened her make-up box. “I go on automatic pilot, really. It takes a good twenty-five minutes to put it all on and transform myself into the cool professional that I know I have to be. I think that if you look well-groomed, then you look as if you’ve got self-control and self-respect.” When I’m putting my make-up on, I usually run through all the questions that are going to be asked at the pre-flight briefing. You can be asked about first-aid, aspects of passenger safety care or about the technical aspects of the aircraft. Some senior cabin staff really like to stamp their authority on the briefing, to show who’s boss. Consequently, these briefings can be really fraught.”

She’d had a lot of late departures recently. There was usually no time for a meal on the stopover. She had to tidy the litter off the seats, check all the sick bags and the magazines in the backs of the seats and restock the range of toiletries laid out in the toilet. “So much for glamour,” she said.

Text D - THE MILLER

Nigel Moon, a graduate in history and archaeology, always wanted to buy a windmill. When a chance came to buy Downfield Mill, he left his job and took a variety of part-time jobs for the five years needed to restore the building to working condition.

On milling days, he can be seen dashing frantically around the five floors, tools usually in hand as he strives to keep all systems going. “Even when there is no wind and the sails are down, it is hard work because I have a set of stones powered by an electric motor. Working the mill this way is not as satisfying as when it is running on the sails, but the two systems often run in concert and the electric system helps to keep production going. I’m not really in the business for the money. There must be thousands of easier ways of making a living.” On the days he is not milling, he is on the road delivering his organic brown and white flour, milled oats, rye, maize and barley to warehouses, bakers and hotels.

Although it is an exhausting, seven-day-a-week occupation, Moon says he would not do anything else. He has reluctantly concluded, however, that the only way to expand his business and to cope with the physical challenge of handling ten tons of machinery as a one-man operation, is to sell Downfield and buy a more efficient mill.
